Thanksgiving Blessings!

It is instructive for us today to recall what life was like for the Pilgrims who arrived on these shores in December of 620. As the Plimoth Plantation describes it:

Many of the colonists fell ill. They were probably suffering from scurvy and pneumonia caused by a lack of shelter in the cold, wet weather. Although the Pilgrims were not starving, their sea-diet was very high in salt, which weakened their bodies on the long journey and during that first winter. As many as two or three people died each day during their first two months on land. Only 52 people survived the first year in Plymouth. When *Mayflower* left Plymouth on April 5, 1621, she was sailed back to England by only half of her crew.

Nevertheless, a year after their arrival they sat down for a feast of thanksgiving. They had befriended and made a treaty of mutual protection with the Pokanoket Wampanoag leader, Ousamequin, also known as Massasoit to the Pilgrims.

In the fall of 1621, the colonists marked their first harvest with a three-day celebration. Massasoit and 90 of his men joined the English for feasting and entertainment. In the 1800s this famous celebration became the basis for the story of the First Thanksgiving.

It would be easy to focus on the passing difficulties of our time, especially for those of us who fight daily to preserve the God-given liberties that have blessed this land since the time of the Pilgrims. But, as they did, we must pause to reflect on all that is good and on the Source of this goodness.

> We gather together to ask the Lord's blessing; He chastens and hastens His will to make known. The wicked oppressing now cease from distressing. Sing praises to His Name; He forgets not His own.

Beside us to guide us, our God with us joining, Ordaining, maintaining His kingdom divine; So from the beginning the fight we were winning; Thou, Lord, were at our side, all glory be Thine!

We all do extol Thee, Thou Leader triumphant, And pray that Thou still our Defender will be. Let Thy congregation escape tribulation; Thy Name be ever praised! O Lord, make us free!

Sons of the American Revolution Miami Chapter BOD Meeting

November 12, 2018

The Miami SAR Chapter Board of Director's meeting was called to order by Compatriot Wolff, Chapter President at 7:05 PM with the invocation given by Compatriot Wolff, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance led by Compatriot Wicks and the Pledge to the SAR led by Compatriot Sileo.

Agenda: The BOD Agenda was approved.

Minutes: Minutes of the previous meeting were read, amended, and approved.

Reports: Compatriot Popham gave a positive report on the Chapter's finances..

Compatriot Wolff reported that the Mayor of Doral Juan Carlos Bermudez and the City of Doral Police Chief Hernan Organvidez will be honored with decorations and certificates.at the November luncheon.

Compatriot Sileo reported that the Chapter had gained six new members this year and 48 prospects.

The 2018 Nomination slate for 2019 officers was approved and will be voted on at the November luncheon.

Vignettes of History

Battle of Mobile

January 7, 1781

The British garrison nearest to Mobile was in West Florida's capital, Pensacola. The commander, General John Campbell, had under his command about 500 men, composed mostly of men from the 16th and 60th Regiments, but also including some Waldecker grenadiers and some Loyalist militia. The British relations with the Creeks, Chickasaw, and Choctaw Indians were also relatively good. Hundreds of Choctaw warriors responded to British pleas for help and came to Mobile.

Emboldened by the destruction of a Gálvez-led expedition against Pensacola by a hurricane in the Fall of 1780, Campbell decided to attempt the recapture of Mobile. On January 3, he dispatched an expedition of more than 700 men untain Johann von Hanxleden.

Hanxleden's force arrived near the dawn attack the next morning. Forty of chored nearby, but the British cut many ans from the expedition then followed scalps. The remaining Spanish coolly


